The October 2013 Auction was a great success and I would like to thank all those who helped on the night, not only with displaying and setting out the lots beforehand, but also with handling and processing sold items so efficiently.

It was the last auction to be held at Napier Hall – a venue which had become more and more difficult to prepare and set up in a suitable condition for putting on such a complicated event. Another thing that struck me was that, whilst acknowledging that, obviously, people want to get away afterwards

reasonably quickly to catch trains etc., it was disappointing to note that even putting a chair away at the end of proceedings seemed to be beyond some members. My thanks, however, to all those who do work to make this event such a success, not least the vendors who entrust their property to us to sell.

We now have to look seriously at the future of this event. I have looked at the Big Hall at our new Pimlico venue and must say that it looks ideal if we *EVER* have such a similar sale in the future. But I am taking this opportunity to put on record that I feel unable to continue as auctioneer any longer without someone understudying the job under my guidance. **If someone does not come forward, the auctions may be at an end, which would be a great pity.**

However, I and the National Committee do feel strongly that that 'someone' should not already be operating as a professional dealer. I would stress that it is not necessary to know what makes up a set or how to value it, as I will continue to provide that back up. When handling collections for people who come to the Society for help in either down-sizing or selling the collections of deceased members, the auctioneer must ensure that the material is offered to best advantage and that the BMSS *and* the vendor profit from the transaction. I am conscious that the Auction has become one of the favourite events in the Society's calendar, eagerly anticipated by many of our members. But it is a major worry to me that, at my age, a day could come suddenly and with little warning when I may not appear on the night! With an understudy, at least the event would go ahead.

Propositions to AGM 2014

Changes to BMSS Constitution (as updated in 2009)

At present, Article 8 of the Constitution states that:

“There shall normally be six meetings of the Committee in a year chaired by the President or, in his/her absence, a Vice-President. Six Committee members shall form a quorum. The President, or in his absence a Vice-President, shall chair the Annual General Meeting. “

Proposal - change to:

“Committee meetings shall be chaired by the President or, in his/her absence, a Vice-President. The Committee shall meet at such intervals as the Chair and members consider appropriate in light of current business and five Committee members shall form a quorum. The President, or in his/her absence, a Vice-President, shall chair the Annual General Meeting. “

Rationale for changes

(a) Frequency of meetings

In recent years, the National Committee has met as many as eight or nine times a year. All NC members now have access to e-mail and it seems unnecessary to meet this often. We are also looking for economies and fewer Committee meetings would mean reduced hiring costs. We are moving to three Committee meetings in a year linked to the key events in the Society's calendar (AGM, Show, Inter-Branch) but the wording proposed leaves frequency in the hands of the Committee itself, as is the case with most societies.

(b) Quorum

We have a smaller Committee than previously, so propose a slight reduction in the quorum requirement from six to five, to ensure that we may continue to conduct business with the reduced number of volunteers now serving on the Committee.

One of the biggest decisions this year was to move the London Meeting from Napier Hall over to a hall, across the Vauxhall Bridge Road, in Pimlico. This was a hard decision as the Society had been functioning out of Napier Hall for many years, not only with the monthly London meetings but with Committee meetings and our auctions as well. The new hall has, so far, been successful and, from the Treasurer's point of view, cheaper to hire!

Inter-Branch, was again held in Knowle in September. Unfortunately, it was only the second time in 24 years that Paul and I had not been able to attend, as we had already promised and were committed to attending a show in Belgium. Both events were successful, however, we were sorry to hear that the attendance at the Inter-Branch was down on last year's figures. Again, I would encourage you to try to come along to join in the day. It is a great time to actually sit and relax and chat amongst fellow members.

2013 also saw the first time that the Society, as far as I know, had a presence at the Telford International Plastic Modellers Show in November. This show is huge and Chris Bartlett did an excellent job over the weekend,

Hon Treasurer

Membership for 2013 was 355 (2012: 369) – a slight decrease from last year (down 3%).

Finances: Following last year's poor figures, this year has shown an improvement, to a break-even position! The figures show a profit of £156 (against 2012 when there was a loss of £3,500). This is due mainly to Subscriptions, which covered the cost of *The Bulletin* for the first time in several years, due in part to the electronic *Extra* and also a reduction in the number of *Bulletins* printed each run, closer matching the number of members. The Annual Show, which was a great day, again did not pay for itself, and the end-of-year figures will show a large loss against it, increased by the deposit paid for this and next year's show which I paid to ensure the hire of the hall at the same price.

Commission from the one auction was £690 (2012 was £1,000 from two).

Support Services have also broken even this year, with the sales of Christmas cards meeting the cost of printing and a few other items being sold (pins, old Christmas cards etc.) throughout the year. Watch the BMSSONLINE website next year for pushing on with the initiative!

The Society holds long-term funds in an Investment Trust. This year has seen a nice continued increase, adding to last year's in the value of the shares held, increased to £44.8k from £32.6k.

As I have reported for several years now, we do have sufficient cash flow at the end of the year to enable the financial continuation of our Society throughout 2014, and I have not had to increase the subscriptions for 2014.

The biggest achievement of the year for the Treasurer? The continued take-up of paying membership subs by PayPal! This has especially helped those overseas members who find great difficulty and added expense in paying by cheque or bank transfer, and those potential members who want to pay by credit/debit card. I have continued with the charge of just £1 to cover the PayPal fee, as this has covered the cost this year. Hopefully, this will see an increase in the membership numbers, both in the UK and abroad. Next year, with the reduced cost of postage and printing for *The Extra* going online, and potential new members, at the

moment I do not see the need to increase subscriptions in 2015. We still need new members, though – let's see if we can make a profit this year of the subs over the cost of *The Bulletin!*

The National Collection Blenheim

Blenheim has had no issues this year and I have visited the site 3 times:

In February 2013, I attended to carry out the original setting up prior to opening.

Then I returned in March 2013 to alter a cabinet and took the opportunity to return and replace some models including some Ping figures.

My third and final visit was in September last year when I carried out a general inspection of our exhibits and everything was found to be fine.

A couple of notable new additions to the collection during the year were a Queen's Ranger donated by the Ontario Model Soldier Society, and a figure of the mounted Duke of Marlborough donated by Dino Lemonofides (a name from the past

who belonged to the Society for a number of years) who cast and paints these figures for the Palace.

Looking forward to our display in the coming year, I have been kindly given some of the late John Hunter's dioramas while George Hanger has also kindly donated some of his excellent figures to the Collection. This will allow me to freshen up some of the cabinets.

Blenheim Palace closed on Sunday 13th December 2013 and then reopens on the 15th February 2014.

A big theme in 2013 has been living within our means at a time of ever-increasing costs. We have made an important saving in postage costs by moving *Bulletin Extra* to electronic format. I know that has not suited everyone but most members have recognised why we have gone down that path and I am grateful for everyone's co-operation. We have also looked closely at the costs associated with London meetings, both those for the monthly members' meetings and the Committee meetings which followed them. Napier Hall was proving both expensive and unsuitable with, of late, constant interruptions and people coming and going. Through the good offices of Paul Newman we have found a very good replacement in nearby Pimlico which seems to work well for the members' meetings and is cheaper. At the time of writing, we have yet to test the venue's suitability for the AGM and a larger room for auctions but are hopeful that our needs can be met there.

All National Committee members have access to e-mail so it seemed sensible to reduce costs further by cutting down the number of Committee meetings to three a year. This means we pay out considerably less for hiring the Pimlico facility. I have proposed minor changes to our Constitution to reflect the new arrangements (see Stephen's note on page 2 in this issue - Ed).

As President, I was pleased to officiate for the first time at the 2013

Annual Show and the 2013 Inter-Branch. Both of these events provide terrific platforms for members (and, in the case of the Show, non-members) to display the quality of their work and their imagination. I saw many remarkable models which are a credit to their creators and demonstrate what can be achieved in miniature. There was a good atmosphere at both gatherings but they illustrate the problems associated with running flagship events. Despite advertising in key journals, and a very positive mention in James Opie's latest book, attendance at the Show continues to fall some way short of what we would ideally want. Similarly, numbers were a bit down for Inter-Branch. Not all members will be able to attend but if you can, it is important that you make the effort. We could also do with more people committing some of their time to help out, especially with the Show, which is a major undertaking.

More generally, I would urge all readers to attend model soldier events, both national and local. Faced with rapidly rising costs, many shows are currently treading a delicate tightrope in terms of viability and need your support if they are not to go under. Attend whenever you can and support traders by buying something!

These are difficult times for societies but I hope that we will all see the BMSS prosper and thrive in 2014. I would like to thank Paul and Julie Newman for their sterling support in the key posts of Treasurer and Secretary, John Regan for his extraordinary contribution in relation to the *Bulletin* and *Bulletin Extra*, John Ruddle for continuing to assemble memorable auctions, Arthur Smith and Alex Riches for their contributions, not least, in the London meetings, Ralph Weaver for his often unsung work on Support Services, Philip Hamilton on Advertising, Robin Marlin and Derek West for shouldering the significant responsibilities associated with the National Collection, and all those who act as Area Reps or otherwise promote the Society.

The Society and the hobby also recently suffered two further blows with the deaths of Harry Strongman, Fellow of the Society and Chairman of the BMSS Aldershot Branch, and Doug Hagger who many members will remember from the paintings and research he published in books and illustrated articles on cavalry uniforms. He was also President of the BMSS way back in 1970. Fuller accounts of Harry's and Doug's lives will appear in the next issue of *The Bulletin*.

The BMSS October Auction

There were quite a few **Britains** lots in this sale, certainly enough to create a fair amount of interest among our members and fill the room with potential buyers. Miracle of miracles, when we arrived, the room was clear and there was even space on the stage for John to work his magic!

As I have previously indicated, the general run of toy soldiers are not quite making what they should, so there were no really high prices at this sale. *The civilian holiday scene*, a fairly modern set by **Mignot**, made the most money but, at £240, this was still a bargain, and a **Britains R.H.A. Gun Team at the gallop with outriders and early officer**, at £160, was another.

The more modern makes, like **Asset** and **Fusilier**, were fetching £2-£3 a figure, and **Britains** £4-£5 a figure, though there were exceptions. Two sets of **Britains German Hussars**, in pretty poor condition, made £120 and £120 respectively, while a set of *French Dragoons*, that, somehow, didn't seem quite right, reached £130. Some *Egyptian Infantry figures*, for which I had commission of up to £300, did not live up to expectation and they were bought by someone for just £30. But 9 *Bulgarian Infantry at the trail* were reasonable at £95 and should have made a bit more [a bit slow off the mark there]. Two beautifully made scenic background pieces of a *Pub*, *Police Station* and *Corner Shop*, made by **Derek Baxter**, brought a top bid of £120, putting them in the

higher price bracket. I am pretty sure that Louis Armstrong never led a 29-piece Band but this item was really good stuff by **George Dodswell** and well worth the £65 paid, as was his 28-piece seated Brass Band at £90. *A Roman Slave Market* by **John Eden** attracted a top bid of £75 but, for 40 figures, that does not seem so much.

Bargains? Well, 10 **Britains Royal Scots** at £50 can't be bad, and a **Britains 21-piece Band of the Royal Marines** was a 'steal' at £80. Two thirds of those attending went home with something and that has to be a good result. I am afraid that I was engaged in handling the auction lots so, with my hands full, you were never going to get that second cup of tea! Sorry about that!

These auctions are important, not just for the money they put into the Society, but also because they bring most of the members who are collectors together. It's thanks to a proposal by John Ruddle, that money we had made from the sale of toy soldiers (mainly duplicates from the National Collection) a couple of years back, means that we are able to finance the Annual Show. I know that the work John does, raising money through the auctions, is appreciated, but it is a difficult, time-consuming and, sometimes, physically demanding job and one we really should not expect a man in his eighties to go on doing for ever. So, as you have already read in John's urgent plea on page 1 of this issue, it has to be time for someone to volunteer to be his understudy and take some of the weight off his shoulders. **Step forward that man, please!**
